MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF



Dear community members and friends,

I am honored to share our 2023 Annual Report. This report is just one of the components in our ongoing commitment to transparency and safety within our community.

In 2023, we responded to 62,071 calls for service, a slight increase to the 59,879 in 2022. With an ever-growing number of people who come into the City of Grand Junction to live, shop, and play, comes an increase in criminal activity.

In 2023, we saw a slight increase in theft by shoplift. We are working with businesses and community members on proactive intelligence-led policing strategies to address and help reduce these types of crimes. With the use of innovative technology, we are able to collect, analyze, and formulate responses to calls for service. Traffic remains an ongoing issue nationwide and Grand Junction is not immune to this. In 2023, we collaborated with local law enforcement agencies to perform monthly surge operations in high traffic complaint areas which yielded an increase in traffic contacts. We have continued these surge operations, with the goal of improving public safety on our roadways.

Our goal in policing is not only to respond to incidents but to prevent them through proactive measures and community engagement. The relationships we have with local public safety agencies, City of Grand Junction leadership, businesses, and residents are vital in creating a safe community.

Our biggest asset, by far, continues to be our people. Their commitment to serving the community with professionalism, integrity, and compassion is not only their duty, but also a part of the culture we strive for. Building and fostering positive community relationships remains at the forefront of serving this community. I encourage you to connect with us over social media and at the various community events our team participates in like Coffee with a Cop, National Night Out, and Community Police Academy.

Thank you for your continued support and trust. It is an honor to work alongside the men and women of the Grand Junction Police Department who serve the members of this community.



Police Operations

The Grand Junction Police Department's Police Operations Division is a cornerstone of the Grand Junction Police Department's efforts to ensure the safety and security of the community it serves. This branch of the GJPD refers to the various activities and duties performed by police officers and other law enforcement personnel while on patrol. The primary goal of patrol operations is to maintain public safety, prevent and respond to crimes, and foster community relations.

GJPD Police Operations Division includes six Patrol Teams, the Traffic Unit, Police Service Technicians, and Municipal Park Rangers.


Patrol

The Patrol Division is the largest and most visible division of the Grand Junction Police Department, responding to both emergency and non-emergency calls for service. This division, comprised of over 60 uniformed police officers in marked vehicles, is responsible for responding to crimes in progress, disturbances, and other incidents requiring police assistance. This can also include proactively patrolling areas to deter criminal activity through their visible presence. Patrol Officers also work to engage with community members to build trust and cooperation. You will often see them talking with residents and participating in local events to strengthen police-community relationships.

Police Services

The Grand Junction Police Department's Services Division encompasses a broad range of functions by sworn and non-sworn personnel. These operations go beyond the traditional patrol duties and involve various specialized services and administrative functions. A large number of the GJPD's civilian employees make up the Services Operations, providing important services to Patrol and the community.

GJPD Services Operations includes the department's Professional Standards Unit/Training, Recruiting, Internal Affairs, 911 Dispatch, Volunteer Services, Victim Services, Records, Evidence/Property, Digital Forensics Analysts, Drug Chemists, and Quarter Master.

Dispatch

The Grand Junction Regional Communication Center (GJRCC) is a 24 - hour, 365 day operation, responsible for dispatching over 25 law enforcement and fire/EMS agencies in the region.

The GJRCC was recognized by the International Academies of Emergency Dispatch as an Accredited Center of Excellence (ACE) for emergency dispatching and was re-accredited as the 291st Medical ACE in the world. Centers who earn ACE status are the embodiment of dispatch done right, and have demonstrated strong local oversight, and a commitment to data-driven continuous improvement.



Incident Dispatch Team

The Incident Dispatch Team (IDT), comprised of members from the Grand Junction Regional Communication Center, responds to large incidents in mobile communications vehicles. The IDT has provided support for Country Jam and the Grand Junction Air Show. This team also responds to unplanned incidents, including search and rescue incidents, large scale SWAT or police incidents, and major accidents on the interstate.





Special Units

The Grand Junction Police Department's Special Units have distinct roles focused on specific areas or responsibilities of community safety and well-being. Whether it is having a presence in the city's public schools and university, working complex cases, serving the unhoused population, crime analysis, or working to ensure the compliance of ordinances and regulations set by the City of Grand Junction, our Special Units are essential for maintaining order, safety, and quality of life within our community.

GJPD Special Units include the department's School Resource Unit, Community Resource Unit, Co-Responder Unit, CMU Officers, Code-Enforcement Officers, Investigations Unit, Marijuana Compliance, Drug Task Force, Intelligence, and ARTIC.

Community Resource Unit

The Grand Junction Police Department's Community Resource Unit or CRU serves the community by developing and implementing programs to prevent crime, promote safety, and participate in community events. CRU works closely with the unhoused population and strives to maintain positive relationships with those they contact by providing assistance and connecting that population with needed resources.

CRU officers also provide residents and local businesses with active-threat presentations and partner with Mesa County Crime Stoppers and the Downtown Development Authority.

Drug Task Force

The Western Colorado Drug Task Force (WCDTF), formed in 1998, consists of detectives from the Grand Junction Police Department and Mesa County Sheriff's Office.


From August 2022 to August 2023, the WCDTF collaborated with the West Metro Drug Task Force in Operation Long John, which resulted in 34 arrests and seizures of 412 pounds of methamphetamine, 356,350 fentanyl pills, 22 pounds of fentanyl powder, three kilograms of cocaine, one pound of heroin, two pill presses and 30 firearms. This investigation was ultimately successful in the dismantlement of the Drug Trafficking Organization, which is linked to the Sinaloa Cartel.

Collateral Assignments

Grand Junction Police Officers often take on collateral assignments in addition to their assigned position within the department. These collateral assignments allow officers to specialize in specific areas or provide support in various operational or administrative functions. These specialized skills contribute to the GJPD in diverse ways, enhancing overall service, response, and effectiveness in keeping this community safe.

Collateral assignments include K9, Crisis Negotiation Team, Honor Guard, SWAT, Bomb Squad, Field Training Officer, Firearms Training Officer, Driving Instructor, Defensive and Patrol Tactics, Drone Operator, Forensic Investigator, and Peer Support.

Bomb Squad

The Grand Junction Bomb Squad is comprised of GJPD Officers and firefighters with the Grand Junction Fire Department. This joint team acquired a new Telerob robot in 2023 through a grant. This new technology will enhance the effectiveness and capability during remote operations and allow bomb technicians to safely handle potentially dangerous and explosive materials. Bomb disposal operations are inherently dangerous, and the use of robots allows Bomb Squad Technicians to operate from a safer distance, reducing risk of injury or death to operators and citizens.

This team is dispatched to incidents in over a dozen counties in Colorado and Utah, as well as handling special events such as the ESPN X Games in Aspen, Colorado.





Commander Steve Moore joined the Grand Junction Police Department in 1997 and spent the first half of his career as a Motor Officer, investigating well over 1,000 serious vehicle crashes. He was heavily involved in mentoring the youth of the Grand Valley, coaching the Palisade High School baseball team. For over 38 years, Steve held steadfast to his values and pursuit of justice.



Corporal Bob Culver joined the Grand Junction Police Department in 1990. From his years as a Patrol officer to his tenure in Investigations, Bob consistently showed his resiliency and commitment to solving crimes and helping victims. Bob held numerous collateral duties, including 19 years as a SWAT operator and 15 years as a Field Training Officer. He retired as a member of the Community Resource Unit, where his contributions were invaluable.



Detective Ed Prescott was selected to become a Grand Junction Police Officer in 1994, where he served on patrol. In 2001, Ed was assigned to the investigations division where he served as a detective, solving over 1,150 criminal cases, including sex assaults on children and adults, felony assaults, and other high-profile felony crimes and homicides. Corporal Tyler Simonson began his career with the Grand Junction Police Department in 2000 and served as a Police Officer for over 23 years. 


